Fire Pit Safety


Enjoying a backyard fire pit is one of the best parts of a Southern Alberta summer.

You do not need a fire permit for a recreational fire pit, but it's important that your fire pit meets Bylaw #22-002.

Fire pit specifications:

constructed entirely of non-combustible materials (bricks, concrete blocks, etc.)

at least 1 metre laterally & 5 metres vertically from above-ground wires



Requirements while burning under the Fire Bylaw:

- Maximum flame height over container: 90 centimetres
- Fire must be supervised by a responsible adult until fully extinguished
- If a Fire Ban is in place, you must extinguish your fire (fines apply for not doing so). Check the Fire Ban status on our website before you use your fire pit.

Safety tips:

- Locate the fire pit away from buildings and overhanging trees (sparks can cause these to ignite)
- Reconsider using the fire pit if it's windy
- Don't burn treated wood (it can give off toxic fumes)
- Have sand or water on hand to quickly extinguish wayward sparks
- Position chairs carefully around the fire in a way that does not require people to get too close to the flames if they need to move
- Don't allow children to play near or get too close to the fire
- Fully extinguish the fire before leaving the area
