

Road Reconditioning in Lethbridge County



How long does it take?

Typically, one mile of road is completed in 1-3 days.

What is involved in the process of reconditioning the road?

The reconditioning process involves crews pulling up the shoulders and narrowing the road back to Alberta Transportation's standard of 8 metres.

Can I still use the road during the reconditioning process?

Although the road will remain open during the reconditioning process, please note that it will be a rough dirt road. Obey all traffic and construction signs and use caution while driving. Please also be aware of workers on or near the road. Rain may make the road impassable so use your discretion when deciding whether to travel on it. Once complete, the reconditioned road may remain soft and/or the new gravel may washboard for a short time.

Why does the County do road reconditioning?

Each year, Lethbridge County Public Works crews perform reconditioning on several miles of gravel roads to ensure our road network is safe for drivers, and our producers can get their products to market. Roads are selected when they have become too wide to properly maintain (this is mainly due to heavy traffic), or because of poor surface drainage.
